## **River Etiquette Sign Installation** We need your help!

The board of the Au Sable River Property Association has approved a project to create and install river etiquette signs at 28 sites along the Au Sable River. These sites include road ends, canoe launches and private canoe liveries. The River Etiquette Committee is asking for your help with the installation of these signs this spring and early summer.


We plan to have several half-day work projects to complete the work by early summer. Each of the work projects will have a well-trained team leader. The most difficult task will be digging the required hole; however, we have purchased a gaspowered hole auger to help with this job. The other tasks for each installation will be

much easier.

Each sign installation is subject to weather conditions, approval of Miss Dig at each site and availability of volunteers. Our plan is to announce upcoming installations via email and/or text and at that time ask if you are available to help at the time and date specified. Some installations will be on weekdays and some on weekends.

# **Be a River Guardian**

It looks like spring is finally here. It is aways fun to get out on your home water or favorite stretch to see what has changed over the winter but it is certainly comforting to see that most things remain the same.

If you are out and about and see something that needs attention, please let us know. You may contact me (poulios@mus.edu) or any ARPOA board member if you see something amiss. Better yet, sign up to be a River Guardian. River Guardians are assigned a specific stretch of the river and wade or float it at least twice during the season and report back on any issues such as:

- Downed trees or any other debris impeding navigation
- Severe erosion
- Any suspected contamination
- Hazardous in-stream structures
- Purple Loosestrife or other invasive species
- Trash or debris
- Unpermitted construction along river
- Any other issues you believe need attention

Some of the issues we can attend to on our own but most we will refer to the appropriate regulating agencies. The ARPOA is not an enforcement entity but acts as a conduit between property owners and the State or Federal agencies designated to protect and preserve the natural resources of Michigan.

To those who generously participated last year, thank you! If you would like to be assigned to the same stretch as last year, let me know. If you have not participated in the past and would like to this year it, let me know. The stretches of the river are as follows:

The Au Sable River has a rich tradition of skilled and talented people whose passions include boat building, rod making, quilting, painting, photographing, and fly tying.


